



#### **Members by Professional Category**




#### **Top 10 Countries by Membership**

#### **Campus Community Network Launches**



- Launched in **January 2023** to bring members together on campuses to support each other's mission-driven efforts, showcase and model HxA values, and improve institutional policies, practices, and culture.
- 51 Campus Communities formed in 2023 across the US, Canada, and the UK
- Campus Communities have **recruited over 302 new HxA members** on their campuses since launching in 2023.


#### **HxCanada Community Hosts Major Conference**

#### **Heterodox Out Loud Podcast**



#### **Center for Academic Pluralism Opens in NYC**



HxA's new Center for Academic Pluralism, funded by a multi-million dollar lead grant from Templeton Religion Trust, enables HxA to deepen its impact at a time of hot debate over the future of higher education. By bringing together scholars at The Center to conduct research, assemble data, and host events, HxA aims to uncover new insights about the role of pluralism in academic life, with the ultimate goal to improve campus culture, climate, and practices.


### Heterodox Scholars at Work

Heterodox Academy members are expert scholars in their fields, but often ask questions and explore answers that are typically overlooked. Our network, and research grants, led to several notable academic publications:

Brigham Young University Researchers Conducted Experiment Showing the Benefits of Constructive Dialogue on Contentious Topics

**Insight**: Participation in structured conversations on COVID-19, mental health, and racism was strongly



associated with improved attitudes related to openness, tribal identity, and moral disdain. Over 95% of participants reported that they enjoyed taking part in the conversations and that it helped them better understand the experiences of others.


**Insight**: Chilled campus speech is not confined to the United States — results show that New Zealand students are at least as reluctant to discuss controversial topics such as politics and gender in class.

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#### HxCanada Members Publish Comprehensive Report on the Free Expression Crisis Across Canadian Universities

**Insight**: The demonstrated threats to academic freedom and viewpoint diversity suggest that existing protections at universities are insufficient in preventing the formation of a monoculture, which can have significant negative impacts on the quality of education that students receive.


**Insight**: Scientific censorship is often driven by scientists, who are primarily

motivated by self-protection, benevolence toward peer scholars, and prosocial concerns for the well-being of human social groups. This perspective helps explain both recent findings on scientific censorship and recent changes to scientific institutions, such as the use of harm-based criteria to evaluate research.

## Student Voice: Free Expression by the Numbers

On HxA's annual Campus Expression Survey:

**58.5% of students reported being reluctant** to discuss at least one of the five controversial topics asked about.

**63.2%** of students agreed that the climate on their campus prevents people from expressing their views because others might find those views offensive.

**62.3% of students** chose "**other students would make critical comments** with each other after class" as the top reason **why they were reluctant** to share their views in class.

A **reluctance to share views** in the classroom **increased at least 10 percentage points** for students who reported **lower amounts of peer interaction** compared with students who reported a high amount of peer interaction.

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# Reviving Open Inquiry in STEM

**The HxA STEM Initiative** — In 2023, Heterodox Academy launched an initiative to <u>revive open inquiry in STEM</u>, which will last through 2024 and is made possible thanks to support from <u>Schmidt Futures</u>, a philanthropic initiative of Eric and Wendy Schmidt. The initiative includes special events, research funding, and other programming

Open inquiry is increasingly under threat in the natural and applied sciences. Whether through the publishing system, rules for competitive grants, restrictions on data access, hiring criteria, or simple social pressure, an orthodoxy of "acceptable" research has found its way to STEM departments on campus (Sciences, Technology, Engineering, and Math).

The stakes are high. When scientific bodies restrict data access, de-fund or stigmatize certain hypotheses, or even make political endorsements, many STEM researchers worry about the long-term impacts for the sciences, including their life-changing discoveries and innovations. This year, Heterodox Academy made a commitment to revive open inquiry in STEM — and it's only the beginning.

#### Professor and HxA Faculty Fellow Elizabeth Weiss Fights for Open Inquiry in Anthropology

Professor Elizabeth Weiss emerges as a steadfast advocate for open inquiry in academia, embodying HxA's core principles. A once lauded professor of anthropology at her home institution, Weiss was canceled for advocating for a pro-research approach of working with native skeletal remains. After



being locked out of her lab with no access to the collections needed to do her research, Weiss joined HxA's Center for Academic Pluralism as an inaugural faculty fellow in 2023. Weiss confronts professional challenges with resilience and a commitment to fostering diverse perspectives within her field.

#### Astrophysicist Beatriz Villarroel Wins 2023 HxA Open Inquiry Award for Courage

Beatriz Villarroel is an assistant professor at the Nordic Institute of Theoretical Physics located within Stockholm University. Her research focuses on the structure and coevolution of active galactic nuclei and their host galaxies and searching for extraterrestrial intelligence.



Villarroel received the 2023 Courage Award from Heterodox Academy for her courage in the face of

harassment and discrimination within her field for <u>her choice to work with</u> exoplanet pioneer Geoff Marcy. As a result of her collaboration with Marcy, she was barred from presenting results her research teams at a Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence (SETI) conference in the United States, and was informed she could not continue her professional collaboration with him if working at a California research institution at which she was applying for an affiliate position.

# HxSTEM Members Publish Influential Op-Ed in *The Wall Street Journal* Challenging the Idea that Merit in STEM is 'Hurtful'

The HxSTEM community has been highly active in challenging orthodoxy in the sciences and defending merit-based evaluation from students in classes through the faculty ranks. In the spring, two prominent members of the HxSTEM community, Jerry A. Coyne (professor emeritus of ecology and evolution) and Anna I. Krylov (professor of chemistry) <u>published an op-ed</u> defending merit in STEM, based on their <u>published academic article</u>, to bring viewpoint diversity to a national audience.
